





What happened at the end of the story?	Pete the cat saved the day by putting out the fire and they drove back to the fire station.	
If that was your class , do you think you would really be able to put out the fire?	No, children should not be around fires. You can only be a firefighter when you grow up.







After Harry came home from playing and getting dirty, what problem did he have?	Harry's problem is that he is so dirty his family doesn't recognize him. They do not believe it is him and that he came home.	
What did Harry do to try and solve his problem?	To try and solve his problem, Harry does all of the tricks he knows. When they still didn't believe him, he gets the scrubbing brush that he hid and brought it to the family so they could clean him off.	
Do you think Harry will want to take a bath next time he gets dirty, or will he run away? Why?	I think Harry will want to take a bath next time because he was so sad when his family didn't recognize him when he was so dirty.

Chameleons are very cool animals. What do you know about chameleons?	I know that chameleons can change their color depending on what they are sitting on or near.	

During Reading (pausing at the times below, ask the question before continuing to watch):

Pause video at:	Question	Example Answer	Student Answer (Add your child's answer in the space below)
3:14	What is happening to the chameleon when he keeps wishing he could be like other animals?	Every time the chameleon wishes he could be like a different animal, part of him changes to that animal. He is starting to look very different from what he normally looks like.

What happened when the chameleon tried to catch a fly to eat?	The chameleon couldn't catch the fly because he had become a little bit of each animal. He can only catch a fly with his own long tongue.

Before Reading (ask this question before starting the video of the book):

Question	Example Answer	Student Answer (Add your child's answer in the space below)
Do you know what "brave" means? Has there ever been a time where you were nervous to do something, but you were brave and tried it anyway?	Brave means to try something, even if it is scary or makes you nervous. One time I was nervous to go on a really big water slide, but I tried it anyway and I had a lot of fun!	

During Reading (pausing at the times below, ask the question before continuing to watch):

Pause video at:	Question	Example Answer	Student Answer (Add your child's answer in the space below)
:57	Why do you think Pete keeps saying "maybe later" when he is asked to go in the water?	I think Pete keeps saying "maybe later" because he is nervous to go in the water. He might be scared to swim so he doesn't want to go in.	

After Reading (after your scholar listens to the whole book, ask the following questions):

Question	Example Answer	Student Answer (Add your child's answer in the space below)
What happened when Pete just put his feet into the water?	When Pete just put his feet in the water, he realized that it cooled him off. He went deeper and deeper into the water.	
What did Pete do when Bob asked him to swim out further to him?	Pete thought about saying "maybe later," but the water felt so good, he decided to be brave and try to learn to surf with Bob.	
Is Pete happy that he was brave? What in the story makes you think that?	I think Pete was very happy that he was brave and tried to swim and surf, even though he was nervous. The story makes me think that because Bob tells Pete that it's okay to be scared, and Pete says "But it's more fun to surf!" He learned something new and had fun doing it.
